

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The Goodwill Bridge (centre) is a dedicated footbridge that links the Brisbane River's north and south banks, connecting the Queensland Maritime Museum at South Bank with the city at Gardens Point. 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
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Well, shedders.


Hi Wayne,



From Terry Thomson: 'Maybe I'm amazed'



A few simple and inexpensive items that live in your car can prevent a minor inconvenience from turning into a serious situation. Think of it as a bug out bag for your car. Here's our essential car kit list that allows you to expect the best but plan for the worst.

1. UMBRELLA

As the saying goes – if you don't like the weather in Melbourne, wait 10 minutes, but Victoria isn't the only state with unpredictable conditions, and there's nothing worse than getting caught outdoors in nasty weather.

Keep an umbrella or emergency poncho in stowage for those times when you must leave the comfort of the cabin in harsh weather. Pro tip – a small stash-away type can live in a small plastic shopping bag, giving you somewhere to stash said umbrella when it's wet. But don't forget to dry it.

2. HI-VIZ VESTS

Some European countries like France require by law that cars have enough high-visibility vests on board for every occupant. That's just how important these simple safety devices are regarded.

If you have to get out of the car for any reason in unexpected circumstances, it makes a lot of sense to make yourself as noticeable as possible to other road users.

And, like life-jackets in a boat, it's best if you have enough for more than just the captain.

They're, cheap, compact and readily available so make sure you have this simple item with you at all times.

3. SPARE TYRE/ TYRE REPAIR KIT

Every car should carry a method of moving the car to a safe place in the event of a puncture. In some cases, this is a full-size spare wheel or smaller space-saver type.

Either way, make sure it's pumped up and roadworthy, otherwise it's nothing more than dead weight, like that troublesome ex or your deadbeat boss.

A warning triangle is also a great idea. Most European cars have them stashed in with the jack, so see if yours has one – otherwise, they are around \$15 from a main street automotive parts supplier.

As well, throw a pair of gardening gloves or cheap mechanic's gloves in the wheel well, because wheels get really grotty.

Alternatively, some modern cars are supplied with a mobility kit, which attaches to the valve of your tyre and pumps in goo to seal minor punctures and re-inflate the tyre, allowing you to at least drive the car to a safer place than the roadside.

Aftermarket versions are available and can be a wise addition to your car kit, especially if you frequently venture into remote areas.

Be warned, though, they can be messy to use, so stash it in another plastic bag with an old rag. You'll thank us later.

4. OWNER'S MANUAL

An owner's manual is an essential item to have in your car. It contains vital information about servicing, emergency procedures, parts, fluid capacities, and countless other important facts and figures. Increasingly, car manufacturers are electronically incorporating the owner's manual into the information and entertainment systems – and there's always Google – but it's a good idea to make note of a few specific functions just in case the on-board systems are unavailable. Knowing how to charge a flat battery is one good example, or resetting the tyre pressure indicator light.

5. Fire extinguisher

Yes, we know, you're not trained to be a fire fighter. However, with very decent extinguishers popping up on sale at stores like Aldi and Anaconda with amazing regularity, the addition of a small extinguisher in your car boot is not the silliest idea in the world.

For as little as \$30-40, an extinguisher can... well, extinguish a small fire before it becomes big and ugly and impossible to put out without the help of pros.

And if you think fires are a rarity, park on top of long grass on a hot day and see what happens... just make sure the extinguisher is firmly secured, though, and that you know how to use it.

6. TORCH

Whether its' your phone's flash, a high-quality LED flood light or a cheap torch, this vital tool can shine a light on a plethora of predicaments.

Whether it's a tricky night-time breakdown, a twilight puncture or a lost contact lens, you'll be happy this gadget is in the car. It's a good idea to keep some spare batteries with it, too.

Torches are not just useful to see with but also allow you to be seen easier at night. If you're trying to attract attention after dark, a torch is very effective.

Snap-light sticks are a variation on the same theme with similar advantages. While these chemical sources of light are not as bright or directional as torches, they are cheap, need no batteries, have no electrics/electronics to fail, are completely waterproof and will remain active for many years. Squirrel one away in a storage pocket and you'll be delighted if you're ever caught in a dark fix.

7. FIRST-AID KIT

One of the most important things to store in a car, a first-aid kit is also a legal requirement in some countries.

Some manufacturers provide these in new cars, some don't. If you don't have a first-aid kit, get one, because having the essentials on-hand to provide basic medical assistance can go a long way, particularly if you're on the road a lot.

8. WATER

Most four-wheel drivers will never go out bush without plenty of spare water for engine problems or to drink if you're stranded miles from anywhere, but this addition doesn't just apply to offroad vehicles.

Even something as small as a 2.0-litre bottle thrown in with the spare wheel can be the difference between life and death in serious situations. And if you do go bush, make sure your washer bottle contains only water, and not screen-cleaning soap.

9. USB CABLE/POWER BANK

Smartphones aren't very smart with a dead battery. Keeping a dedicated charge cable in the car is not just convenient day-to-day, it also means your phone will have power in an emergency. Keeping a small power bank charged and in the vehicle is also smart.

If the car suddenly loses its electrics, you'll still be able to power phones and other electrical items.

10. SOMETHING TO WRITE WITH

How many times have you been in a situation where you've desperately needed a pen or pencil? The details of people involved in an accident, the number plate of a vehicle involved in something suspicious, or just the web address of an ad you've heard on the radio... keep a good pen in the glovebox and it'll save you from using your good lipstick to write on your hand. Hey, we've all been there.

WHAT NOT TO KEEP IN THE CAR

Spare keys kept anywhere in the car are not only useless when you really need them, but also one of the most common ways cars are stolen. Spares should be kept securely away from the car but not so securely that you can't remember where.

Mobile phones are the modern day Swiss army knives but never rely exclusively on a phone as your only lifeline. You can be sure that when you need it most, the battery will be low or worse, flat. Make sure you have alternatives to all your essential phone functions such as emergency numbers, maps and addresses.

Whatever you choose to keep in your car, make sure every item has a place. Don't leave any item that even looks vaguely valuable on display to opportunistic criminals and large or heavy objects should be secured to prevent them from becoming a hazard in the event of a crash.

The Members' Shed a series on association governance

The vocabulary of meetings

A motion is a proposition put to a meeting. A resolution is a decision of a meeting. Apologies are accepted. Minutes are confirmed. Inwards correspondence is received. To move that a piece of correspondence be not received is to officially ignore it. Outwards correspondence is endorsed. Accounts are passed for payment.

Reports may be received or adopted or endorsed. If one seeks to (merely) place a report before a meeting, the traditional motion is: I move that the report be received. If one seeks to recommend a report to a meeting, the traditional motion is: I move that the report be adopted. If one seeks to recommend a report to a third party, the traditional motion is: I move that the report be endorsed.

The language of motions sounds a bit arcane. 1 If an attendee at a meeting is uncomfortable with such language, it's perfectly OK to say, I move that the report is adopted or, indeed (just), Let's adopt this. What really matters is that the chairman understands the mover.

The Model Rules frequently refer to the business of meetings. Business is a broad term encompassing agenda, debate, decision etc. Business is transacted or conducted. Rule 35(6) states that notice (advance warning) of a general meeting must state the business to be conducted at that meeting.2

Notice gives members the opportunity to attend a meeting at which particular business will be transacted e.g. a member might choose to attend a meeting at which the constitution is discussed. But the same member might choose not to attend a meeting at which membership fees are discussed.

The business of a general meeting must not stray beyond the **scope** of the meeting e.g. a meeting called to consider the constitution must not consider membership fees. Conversely, it's a mistake to define the scope of a meeting too narrowly e.g. notice to adopt a particular motion would be inappropriate – because resolutions would be restricted to that motion alone i.e. the motion could be either carried, or not carried: it could not be amended.

The method of voting at a general meeting is determined by the management committee: Rule 38(4). For most associations, voting is by show-of-hands. But if 20% of attendees demand a secret ballot, voting must be secret: Rule 38(5). The Model Rules give no power to attendees to insist on a show-of-hands. The management committee must therefore exercise caution in distributing voting slips ahead of time. Such action might be interpreted as an attempt to manipulate the outcome of a meeting.


- 1. Motions are usually phrased in the subjunctive mood, a linguistic form traditionally used for wishes, suggestions, demands etc. (See the underlined words in the text). Some grammarians argue that use of the subjunctive is dying in English.
- 2. The Model Rules do not state that notice must refer to a motion.

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

Financial Report - John Wild Treasurer

The tabled Income & Expenditure Report and Balance Sheet Report are the reports for the July – June 2025 period. These reports will be tabled and ratified at the Management Committee meeting on 9^{th} July 2025. The data will then be subject to the normal end of year audit in readiness for the AGM.

The result of \$4,609 (Budget \$81) (Year to Date & before Grant Income & Expenditure) is a good result and has mainly come about due to:

- 1. Membership Renewal funds received of \$16,854. This is down on this time last year (\$17,205) with new memberships of \$3,436 also down on this time last year (\$3,550).
- 2. Other Income earners were excellent sales of Cubby House & other raffle tickets \$7,820, other excellent revenue from the Workshop (\$2,029), Emerging Technology (\$1,315) Bunnings Sausage Sizzles etc (\$3,096) sales of 2nd hand equipment (\$2,520) and Bank Interest (\$5,037) have assisted greatly in this result.
- 3. The net Equity of the MGMS is \$837,091 including \$197,734 in Cash & Cash Equivalents.

Some of the other matters I am currently working through are as follows:

- The Asset Depreciation schedule for the year has been completed and the effects of that are shown in these tabled accounts however still subject to audit.
- A revised Asset By-Law has been written, and I appreciate the input from Stephen Spinks on that document as well as the work we have done together on the Asset Register. That document will now go to the By-Law sub-committee for finalising before the MC are requested to approve it.
- The work on the 2025/2026 Budget has been completed and approved by the MC. I appreciate the input from the various coordinators assisting me in preparing that document.

Building & Grounds: Tony G

A condition for our lease is to maintain the buildings to a certain standard. The big doors need painting. A council arborist has deemed the large gum must remain although falling branches have damaged parked cars.

Community Projects: Bart McKnight

Container purchased to house medical equipment. It will be stored on the extra 6 metres of land west of existing shed. Showgrounds Trust has extended our lease and footprint.

Thanks to Skinny and Ross for repairs to the cubby caravan. First outing will be the Mt Gravatt show 26-27 July where a free site is available. Volunteers required to man the stall. Articles such as toys, leatherwork, art, woodturners' bowls etc needed for sale.

As time passes it is more difficult to get volunteers. Soon it will be very difficult to operate as members are very contented to do nothing.





On Monday 7 July, the shedders who attended the Social Meeting were treated to an entertaining talk from Tim O'Dwyer, a well-known and highly respected lawyer who specializes in property law. Tim has appeared on A Current Affair on numerous occasions, he lectures at University of Queensland and his wise advice has appeared in magazines such as the Property Investment Magazine, newspapers and other publications.

Tim began his talk with what he regards as his three unchanging rules of real estate.

Rule 1: Sales people move fast.

Rule 2: Conveyancing solicitors move slowly.

Rule 3: People often change their minds about apparently binding property deals.

During his talk, Tim added two more rules of real estate:

Rule 4: People often don't read contracts.

Rule 5: Courts are good places to stay out of, (adding, "just like hospitals").

Referring to his book, Real Estate Escapes Tim recounted some humorous examples of how he was involved in killing contracts when either buyers or sellers have a change of heart Tim cautioned that while some attempts to escape contracts were successful, others failed miserably — and often expensively.

From my vantage point, I could see that all the Shedders were paying close attention to what Tim was saying. Tim was providing good advice, for free.

For the second part of his talk, Tim opened up for questions from the floor. One of the first questions was relevant to most Shedders and related to either downsizing or buying a residence in an aged care complex.

For almost all of the questions, Tim's advice had a common refrain, two pieces of advice.

- "Seek advice from a solicitor before signing anything because some of the contracts were up to 60 pages in length, or even longer",
- "Don't use the solicitor recommended by the owners of the aged care complex, seek independent advice."




