# Vale Paul Land (The Builder)

Paul Land passed away on 24th January 2026. The Men's Shed offers Paul's wife, Barbara, our sincere condolences.

Paul had been working for years for Bob Pope, so they well knew the nuances of building. In constructing our building, a small band of dedicated workers followed Paul's leadership and worked day after day to build our clubhouse and workshops that will last us for many years. Various construction companies built the foundations, concrete floors, block walls and roof, after which our men, led by Paul, installed the windows, doors, the ceilings, kitchen cupboards, office benches.

Bob Nunn, a qualified painter retired from QBUILD and faithful friend of Paul's, guided our members in painting all the interior and exterior of the building. This also was a massive effort as a huge majority of the work was done on scaffolding.

Thousands of volunteer man-hours were spent so that we could save thousands of dollars.

Thanks to Bob Pope, Paul Land and our volunteers, we were able to construct a building for \$360 000, which, at the time of construction, was valued at \$700,000. Today, it would be valued at well over one million dollars.

At the Official Opening of the building on the 6th of April 2013, Paul was awarded Honorary Life Membership of MGMS as a token of the esteem of the members for his considerable fortitude and devotion to duty.

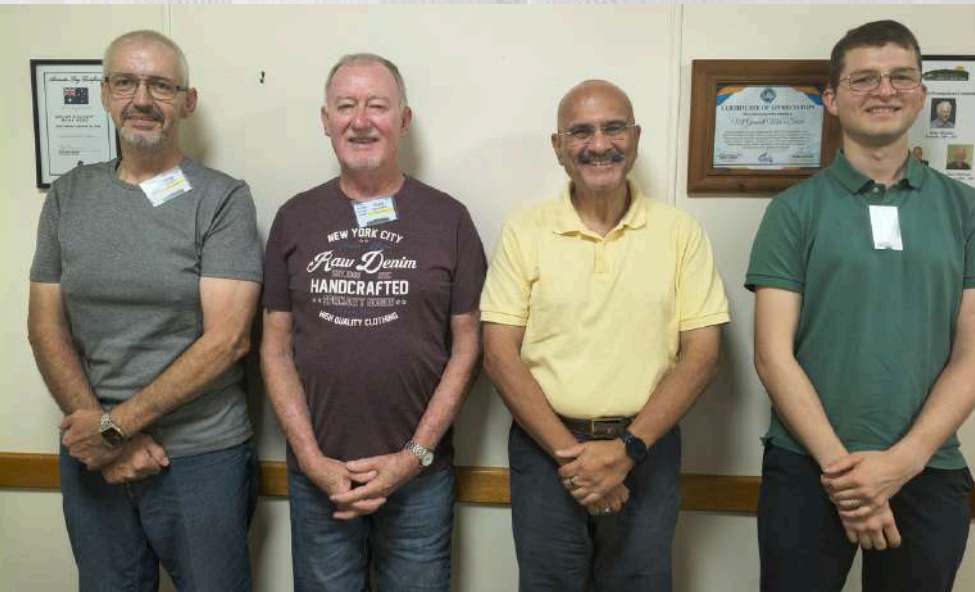

# Social Meeting

2<sup>nd</sup> February 2026



Eighty-five members attended the February Meeting



*Kevin Lindeberg, Lionel Armitstead & Clem Campbell*



Guest speaker Clem Campbell graduated as an Agricultural Scientist from the University of Queensland in 1970. He worked with the QDPI in Brisbane and Roma, Bundaberg Canegrowers and Bayer Agriculture. He also was a Adjunct Research Fellow with QUT and Griffith University researching Parliamentary Ethics and Codes of Conduct.

Clem served as the chairman of the United Nations Association of Australia (Queensland Division), Inaugural chairman of Green Cross Australia, a director of Football Queensland, member of the Central Queensland University Council and Chairman of Earth Charter Australia.

He was elected five times as the Member for Bundaberg in Qld Parliament 1983-1998 and served as the chairman of the Members' Ethics and Privileges and, Deputy Speaker, Chairman of Committees and member of the Minister's Primary Industries Committee.

He was awarded the Order of Australia Medal in 2014 for his contribution to the community as an advocate for peace and environmental education and leadership in promoting ethics in public life.

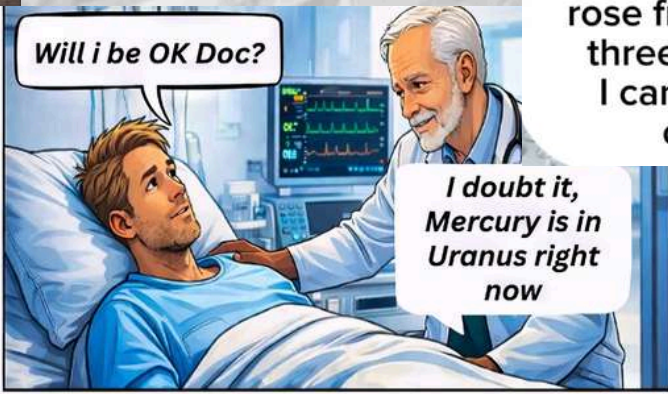

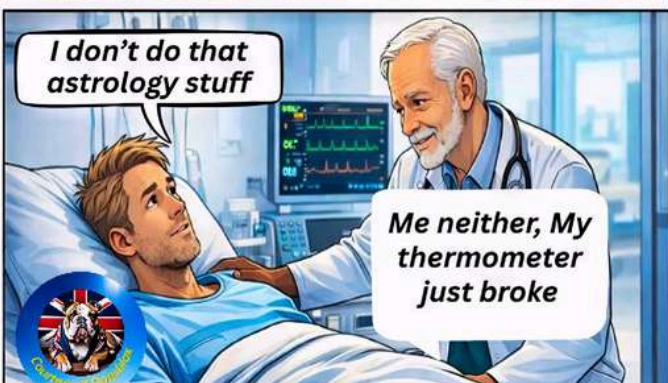

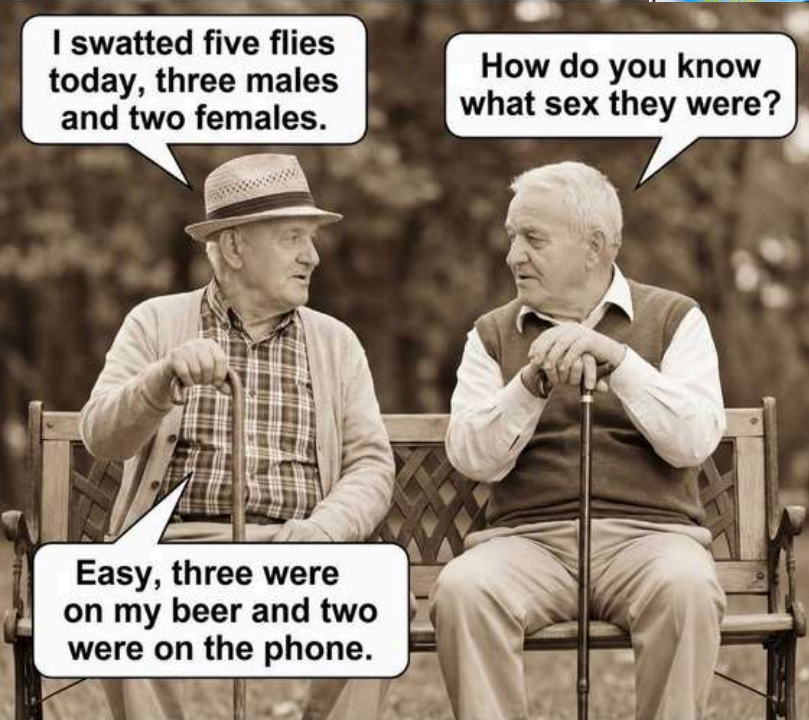
